The Parish Council have decided that because of the uncertainties regarding the coronavirus pandemic, it is best to postpone the litter pick in Great Tey until Spring of next year. Further details will be given nearer that time.

SIGNAGE AT THE BROOK ROAD DEVELOPMENT

The Parish Council are seeking clarification from Colchester Borough Council on the signage at the Brook Road development as we have not been advised of the contribution to the village's community benefits that it mentions.

The Parish Council would like to thank all those parishioners who have shown community spirit by helping neighbours with shopping and other help during the coronavirus pandemic, especially Sarah Barron, Peter Fairs and Penny Clayton.

NEW TOWNS & INFRASTRUCTURE

WITHOUT admitting the so called 'GardenCommunities' were an expensive mistake,Colchester and Braintree Councils have agreed to withdraw West Tey and West of Braintree new towns from the Local Plans. Braintree have started a public consultation, rather than just following the Planning Inspector's guidance. To reduce risks of speculative planning attempts, Local Plans do need to be approved asap. Encouragement to councillors and MPs would be helpful.

North Essex Garden Communities Limited, the company set up by our local authorities and Essex CC, is being wound up. Papers presented to Colchester's Scrutiny Panel on 17 August show NEGC cost us all £6.88million. Colchester have asked for an external review of costs.

Does this mean we can relax, with our region no longer at risk from vast new development, unsupported by appropriate infrastructure? Apparently, not. The Ministry of Housing has started a consultation on planning reform with a new formula for housing targets. Colchester have stated this may result in doubling its house building from around 1,000 to 1,600 pa (60% surely?). In contrast, Braintree thinks it can reduce its numbers.

The suggestion is that land is zoned 'growth'; 'renewal' and 'protected'. Countryside is not given a category, so unless it's specifically designated it may not be protected.

On infrastructure, for the A12 widening between Kelvedon and Marks Tey, the 2019 routes through Copford have been eliminated and a preferred route was announced at the end of August: https://highways england.co.uk/our-work/east/a12-chelmsford-to-a120widening-scheme/

Sadly, the A120 has claimed another young life and there is no obvious progress on re-routing the road. It is in Highways England's pipeline for Road Improvement Strategy 3 - after 2025 - subject to funding being allocated.

MEMORIES OF OLD TEY

In these difficult days of lockdown one of Great Tey's oldest residents has been reflecting on what life was like in the village through the Forties and after the War.

The old school in Chappel Road was home to three classes for youngsters up to school leaving age of 14, with some pupils thinking nothing of a half hour walk each way to get to their classrooms from home.

The head at the rime was Mrs Edwards who lived next door.

" Air raid drills were regular. The wardens would come round at home, knocking on the door saying they would see a chink of light"

At that time she lived in a cottage on the edge of the village. There was no electricity, with oil lamps in use .

She had moved to the village in 1942 with her parents, two sisters and three brothers. Her youngest brother was born six months later during as frightening air raid.

There was an army camp in Chalkney Wood, a searchlight powered by a generator on the edge of the village and a strip of landing lights that were used to guide allied planes into Earls Colne.

The Chequers was the main hostelry at the time and was popular with American servicemen.

Shopping was not too much of a problem in those days. As well as the old post office there was another shop in Chappel Road at that time selling a wide range of goods including bed linen. The blacksmiths nearby also sold petrol and cigarettes. There was also Mr Higgleton the shoemaker.

Just one bus on a Saturday enabled villagers to get into Colchester to shop.

An annual fete was held on what was the cricket field opposite the church.

The long-time resident can even remember the VE day celebration to mark the end of six years war in Europe

Wood, old boxes and anything that would burn were piled up near the Lych Gate by the 900 year old parish church for a celebration bonfire. Residents were in a celebratory mood. A teenager at the time, she recalled how the VE day bonfire was spontaneous but got out of hand.

"There was a hell of a fire going. It started to affect the overhead wires. Panic stations set in and they moved us all back."

There were street parties for youngsters later but leaving the old village school at 14 meant she missed out.

She was born near Dublin but came to Essex with her family. Her father originally worked with horses. Her first main job was tailoring with Hollingtons at Coggeshall.

Great Tey was use to military activity in during the War. At the time of D-Day she can remember lots of aircraft in the skies.

" They took off from Wormingford, the sky was black with aircraft with gliders behind. The aircraft all had black stripes."
