CHURCH NEWS - CURRENT REPAIRS TO ST BARNABAS

How are they getting on?

Phil and his helpers have been working on the inside of the church for more than a month. The last time the church was re-decorated was something like 30 years ago! Back then, Ivan Dyer did the bulk of the work from ladders! We can't do that anymore, in fact the whole of the nave and chancel was scaffolded this time and repainted with lime wash. We can't use modern emulsions because they do not let the walls breath and damp stains would follow. With scaffolding in place, it has been possible to check and repair lighting and repair plasterwork. We have also installed some extra storage space.

When will the churches in Great and Little Tey be open?

The repairs are finished for the moment and we are putting St Barnabas back to rights. We have a bit more to do in the ringing chamber and belfry, but because there are bats there, we have to wait until September to finish off when we can do so without disturbing them.

ST Barnabas is still closed until the church is straight again, but St James at Little Tey is open for private prayer from about 10.30 am to 4pm. We are still awaiting news as to when we might be able to hold services again, socially distanced to begin with, probably, as we did last summer. We will let you know as soon as we have any news.

In the meantime, John Carr has been sending a message to regular members of the congregations and anyone else who would like to receive it, giving links to services that are being streamed, along with suggested readings and prayers for the week. What is happening about a new rector now John Richardson has retired?

Great Tey Church is a joint parish paired with Little Tey. We have also shared our rector with Wakes Colne and Chappel. As many of you will know, there is a shortage of clergy these days and most clergy have to look after even more than 4 rural parishes. The diocese is currently thinking how best to reorganise the parishes in this part of Essex, to make sure everyone has someone responsible for doing all the things that John used to do, without overloading any one clergyman or woman. Members of congregations and village communities will undoubtedly have to become more involved if they can.

In the meantime, once Covid allows, the PCC and in particular the 4 church wardens, will arrange for local clergy and lay volunteers, to take services for us.

We will keep you posted in due course on:

Can we have Weddings, Funerals and Baptisms?

Within Government guidelines for Covid 19, we will continue to offer to hold weddings, funerals and baptisms at the two churches. Please phone one of the wardens to discuss with them what is possible.

Why do you need money when you are selling the Rectory?

As many of you will know, the Rectory is being sold. However, the house is not owned by the parish. It belongs to the Church Commissioners, who look after the whole church estate. The Church commissioners contribute to the cost of having a vicar/rector so we do benefit indirectly when property that they own is sold off. We are likely to be given a relatively small amount from the sale price.

The PCC will be considering what best to do with these funds when they arrive. It will be bearing in mind that we do not know how much financial support we will get, in the future, for running the parish. As a result, we will want to put a considerable proportion of these funds away for a rainy day. We can only spend it once!

PLEASE CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG

With more people using the local area for exercise and walking their dogs, the Parish Council has become aware of an increase in dog fouling on the pavements and verges in the village.

Dog fouling is not only extremely unpleasant, it can also be dangerous as contact can cause an infection called toxocariasis; this nasty infection, whilst rare, can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures. Most dog owners clean up after their pets, but we would like to remind everyone that it is your responsibility to pick up and dispose of your dog's waste. There are a number of dog poo bins around the playing fields in the village, but any bin can be used.

Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £100.

So remember - Pick up your poo...any bin will do!

AN ALTERNATIVE SUGGESTION FOR THE NEW BARN ROAD SITE

With the emphasis nationwide on planting trees for the environment and in particular the recent articles featured on BBC Countryfile, I would like to propose to the Parish Council and the Village as a whole, the creation of a 'Great Tey Wood'. This I see (with appropriate approval of surrounding residents) being suited to the New Barn Road site.

We know how much the countryside has meant to everyone during the restrictions of the Pandemic, in particular walking in woods and the benefits that brings. Also from an environmental perspective creating a Wood with natural 'British' trees would reduce our local 'Carbon Footprint', absorbing carbon dioxide and giving off valuable oxygen, essential to life.

If we imagine the excessive Carbon Footprint created by having a development on that land; Digging up the land, lorries back and forth, the use of materials, and the eventual increase in Carbon when the properties are occupied.

I envision the Great Tey Wood providing solace and relaxation for the village, helping to reducing stress and mental maladies.

So, are the land owners and the Council able to 'stand up and be counted' and take the environmental option, with all the positive associations that could have for them.

If the Wood was agreed I would be willing to donate £100 towards a tree planting project. If a large enough number of local people were able to make donations, we could easily make a start on creating a 'Great Tey Wood'. Just think of the kudos the land owner(s) could gain locally and wider afield if they donated the land for this project, newsworthy indeed in the current climate of creating a better more environmentally friendly world. *Peter Wiggins*
