Whitsun, Pentecost or just half term?

Many of us just associate Whitsun or Whit Sunday with a bank holiday, and the start of half term. It used to happen 6 weeks+ after Easter. Then the bank holiday and half term became fixed at the end of May. This still begs the question what was Whitsun really all about?

According to Christian tradition, Whitsun celebrates the day the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples. It was explained to them that Christ would be with them, not in bodily form, but in spirit. This was to help and strengthen them as they prepared to go out into the world to persuade everyone to follow the teachings of Jesus of Nazereth. The Whit or White bit may be the result of the fact that white celebratory garments would be worn.

As with so many of our church festivals, it is thought that some of the ways in which Whitsun was celebrated in mediaeval times came from a pre Christian pagan festival taking place at the beginning of the second half of the year – 'Summers Day'

Pentecost is just another name for Whitsun. This time the name comes from the Greek and refers to a Jewish festival of that name, celebrated at the same time of year.

By the time you read this we will have celebrated Whitsun. We will try to give you more notice next year.

The 'Annual General Meeting '

The way the Church of England manages its affairs is a mixture of centuries old tradition and modern practicalities. We have just experienced this at what is, to all intents and purposes, our annual general meeting, even if it isn't called that!

The Vestry Meeting – election of churchwardens
The people who are responsible, with the rector, for all church affairs, are the churchwardens.

Up until the mid 19th century all parishes were administered by 'the Vestry'. This was a cross between a secular Parish Council and a churches Parochial Church Council; meetings being held in the church vestry. From the mid 19th century these two rolls were separated out and a Parish Council took over secular matters and developed its own governance practises.

The annual, so called 'Vestry Meeting' is the last remaining vestige of the old system. At it the churchwardens are elected. Anyone living in the parish whether church goers or not, as well as the PCC, can vote.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting - The 'AGM'

The 'APCM' is conducted just like an AGM. When a vote needs to be taken, those who are on the electoral roll, in other words, signed up members of the congregation, are allowed to vote. Anyone in the parish can attend

We will talk about the electoral roll another day! In the meantime, a list of PCC members and office holders can be found on our website.

HOUSELEEKS (sempervivums)

What a tricky spring! Wet winter; very dry spring but also very cold and now cold and wet. My garden is becoming more springlike, but thankfully very slowly, as I am not in a hurry to spend huge amounts of time outside yet. Maybe when you read this the sun will be shining.

Wandering round the garden centre, looking to see what I could plant out without fear of frost, I noticed plenty of houseleeks, modestly priced and available in collections of contrasting colours. I have a bit of a weakness for these obliging little plants. They will tolerate any amount of drought, they are easy to propagate



and look good in the garden or in shallow pots. There are literally hundreds of named varieties. There was a time when I had about 150 different varieties. However, one day the chickens got out and scratched all over the pots, sending plants and labels flying. I was too dispirited to start again!

Now I keep a variety of colours and forms without worrying about names. They come in shades of green, red, purplish and grey. Some have smooth leaves, some rough ones, some look as if they have spiders webs attached to them. The great thing about them is that they are very easy to propagate. They send out new tiny plants on the end of stems. You just cut them off and plant the little ones in gritty, well drained compost and away they go. In a 9" pan you can make a little 'garden' ideal for a terrace or patio.

Half term is coming and these are just the thing for a spot of gardening with children or grandchildren. There seems to be a bit of a current craze for anything cacti-like. Several of my grandchildren have one or two that go to college with them or decorate their bedroom. Houseleeks are a bit like outdoor cacti but aren't anything like as fussy!

Those who remember their Latin will realise that they are not called 'ever living' for nothing, so no fear of dying from lack of water. The Romans actually used to grow them on their tiled roofs as they were supposed to bring good luck and we all need some of that!
