

ECC UPDATE Cllr. Lewis Barber

Since my last update, I have been working with the Parish Council, Borough Cllr Peter Chillingworth and the community to ensure your priorities are addressed.

I am pleased to confirm that resources

have been secured for repairs to Greenfield Drive. This will take place between 24th January 2022 and 1st February 2022. There will be a road closure in place during this period but access to properties will be maintained. I will work to see if this date can be brought forward at all but the repairs will be taking place.

I also arranged a meeting on site to examine how to improve safety at and around the Earls Colne Road and Chappel Road junction. Following this, I submitted an application to the Local Highways Panel (LHP), who would oversee any changes and on which I am a member. The LHP is investigating possible solutions to improve safety. There are existing land ownership queries that need addressing too.

In respect of wider road safety issues, such as speeding, I requested Highways conduct road surveys. These are the required first step before speed reduction schemes are considered for funding. Once I have received the data, which at the time of writing should be received any day soon, I examine the works with Cllr Chillingworth and the Parish Council to discuss possible next steps, before community consultation.

Flooding issues continue to be a challenge. Please report all flooding issues as a first point of call on the Essex Highways website. If you are having any difficulties, or you receive an unsatisfactory response, please do get in touch with me so I can try to resolve. Highways are aware of flooding on Brook Road and it has written to landowners to clear blocked ditches to help address the problem.

We are also all working to ensure that the jubilee tree on the Moor Road/Chappel Road junction is saved. This historic tree is now struggling with the fact the surrounding concrete surface is limiting its access to necessary water and nutrients. We are in the process of gaining the required permissions to ensure the tree gets the work it needs done.

ECC is launching a new bus strategy as part of the national changes to bus policy. This new strategy has the ambition to increase bus usage. I would welcome feedback on the local bus service and what changes you would like to see. Please do let me know your thoughts so I can ensure the new strategy works for Great Tey.

Finally, a reminder that applications for primary school place for September 2022 are now open. You can apply through the ECC website but please be aware that ECC does not write to parents/guardians to remind them to apply. The deadline is 15th January 2022.

Guy Fawkes – the Cubs learnt all about Guy Fawkes and keeping safe during the bonfire festivities. They also built their own Cub Guy out of newspaper and old clothes and enjoyed sparklers in the fresh evening air!

Remembrance Day – the Cubs learnt about what Remembrance Day stands for and made Poppy Wreaths.

COULD YOU BE A BLOODRUNNER?

The Essex Voluntary Blood Service – or Essex Bloodrunners for short, is a charity providing medical courier services to the NHS and our local Air Ambulances. We are one of 30 such organisations in the UK.

From the NHS Blood Bank at Basildon, our unpaid volunteers deliver blood and blood products to A&E Hospitals in Essex and East London; deliver samples for analysis to a NHS Lab in North London, and via Princess Alexandra Hospital in Harlow, supply blood to the Air Ambulances at Earls Colne and North Weald every night. Amongst many other tasks we also courier breast milk from donors to the Hearts Milk Bank and Addenbrooke's Hospital.

We operate every weekday night, and day and night shifts at weekends and Bank Holidays. Our enhanced support to Hospitals during the Covid-19 pandemic has also introduced a weekday daytime shift. We now need more members. You choose in advance the days and shifts you work. We are looking for reliable and responsible men and women from all backgrounds, employed or retired, with a motorcycle, car or van, a mobile phone and internet access. You will receive training, documentation, full support and a hi-viz uniform jacket.

You will work alone on a delivery run with a typical round-trip distance from home of between 60 and possibly over 120 miles, and be the face of Essex Bloodrunners to the public and NHS staff. The work is not glamorous; can be tiring; you may work unsocial hours in all weathers and you will add thousands of miles to your vehicle. You are unpaid and cover all your own expenses... so not much going for it really!

However, rather like being a First Aider or Blood Donor, this is one of the very few ways that an ordinary member of the public can help save a life.

The Chequers is booked for the 15th, and we have our last meeting of the year on Wed the 8th of Dec.





Advent

The churches season of Advent lasts for the 4 weeks leading up to Christmas day. The name comes from the Latin adventus, meaning 'coming'. It marks the beginning of the churches year and the coming of the birth of Christ. In former times Advent was marked by extra fasting days and purple hangings on the alter. The church still often uses the purple hangings on the alter in Advent and marks the 4 Sundays in Advent by lighting a candle on a wreath each Sunday and one on Christmas Day.

Nowadays most of us remember Advent, because our children and grandchildren open a door in their Advent Calendar every day for the 25 days leading up to Christmas. It is thought that this started in Germany at the beginning of the 20th century. Sometimes a candle is burnt down a little bit each day until the 25th

Christmas

Like so many of the Christian Festivals, the way we celebrate Christmas is a mixture of Christian and pre-Christian festivities. The date for the celebration of Christ's birth was settled in the early days of the church. It may have been partly a matter of convenience to choose a time already associated with light and re-birth at the winter solstice in the Roman Calendar. The evergreens that we bring into the house and sing about in carols, for instance 'The holly and the ivy' were used in pagan times to symbolise rebirth and the enduring qualities of plants and their ability to be 'reborn' in the coming year. Fires and lights were an important part of the celebrations. It wasn't difficult to graft onto these traditions a Christian message - red berries to symbolise the blood of Christ that would be shed at the end of Christ's life and candles for the 'light of the world'.

We sometimes refer to Christmas as 'Yuletide'. This is another reference to pre-Christian celebrations and feasting in midwinter. German and Scandinavian countries all had similar words for these festivities and were brought to this country by the Anglo Saxons. When King Halkon of Norway became a Christian, he too made sure that the celebration of Christ's birth coincided with pagan Yuletide festivities.

Christingle celebration with Nativity Play

This celebration marks the arrival of the Christ child bringing light into the world. It reminds us that we are part of a world community and we all share the planet's bounty. We celebrate with;

An orange, representing the world. A candle pushed into the centre of the orange, then lit, representing Jesus Christ as Light of the World. A red ribbon wrapped around the orange or a paper frill around the candle, representing the blood of Christ. Sweets skewered on cocktail sticks pushed into the orange, represents the fruits of the earth

There will also be a short Nativity Play included in the service

There will be a retiring collection for UNICEF, a charity which works for disadvantaged children around the world

The Church will be decorated for Christmas, including a Christmas Tree and candles. There will be the traditional Christmas readings read by representatives of village organisations and well known carols.



TREES!In particular, Quinces and Medlars

We have all been asked to plant more trees to help combat climate change. I'm not sure I can manage that at Bucklers or it will begin to look likeSleeping Beauty's castle after 100 years, in other words invisible within a wood! However, I have been reminded that we all

make choices even if we only have a small garden and that that choice is all the more difficult if we have only room for one or two trees.

One of my favourite small trees is the quince – Cydonia Oblonga – It has everything going for it. It grows a bit like an apple tree, to which it is related.

The original habitat quince the is the eastern Mediterranean. The Greeks called it `Cydonia' from a town in Crete where it would certainly have grown in ancient times. It produces a better crop that an apple tree in hotter climates, so was popular in Roman cooking. If you happen to have a copy of the recipes of Alpicius (he lived between 30BC and the forty's AD), he has recipes for cooking quince with honey as well as with meat.

The quince is not naturally a large tree, but if it gets too large it can be judiciously pruned to keep it in bounds. I have two varieties, one Meeches Prolific, seems to grow more vigorously and I do prune this a little most years, and a second, Vranja, which seems naturally to be a bit smaller. I planted this one more than 20 years ago and it still is quite a small tree.

All Quinces have very pretty, pale pink flowers which arrive after the leaves. This means they often avoid frost damage. They then produce

beautiful clear yellow fruit. Those of Meeches Prolific are enormous, often 6 inches in length and weighing up to 500gm and it is a more reliable cropper in our, not very reliable, climate. This autumn the leaves on one of the trees have gone the most spectacular shades of yellow and russet.

Quinces are pretty, garden trees and for that reason I would recommend them, but the glory of the tree is the jelly that you can make from the fruit. I have just made a batch and it is sitting in the window in the kitchen, a positively luminous shade of pinkish apricot. It is delicious with scones and cream or used like redcurrant jelly with lamb or game. The Spanish eat it with cheese and that is good too.

The Medlar tree – Mespilus Germanicus is another good candidate for a smallish garden. This tree also

has its origins in the Western Asia and especially Persia and Turkey. It has probably been in cultivation for 3,000 years. The Greeks and Romans grew it. Its great advantage was that its fruit stayed on the tree into winter. What is more, the fruit becomes edible when it is beginning be over ripe and soft which also means it lasts into winter. For those of a sensitive nature leave out the next couple of sentences! The medlar's brown fruit is a strange shape. This gave it its name in Chaucerian English 'open arse' and the French common name for it is 'dog's arse' – less sensitive times!

Nowadays the principal reason for growing the medlar is that it isn't too large, it has pretty pink flowers that appear after the leaves, it grows into an attractive umbrella shape and its leaves turn a good colour in autumn. The fruits are edible as described above, but not that exciting! Similarly, one can make jelly from them, but it is a bit dull, rather like apple jelly.

If you decide to grow either of these trees, the quince tree prefers a slightly damper soil

(I put the hose on mine a couple of times a summer). PS. If you want to try quince jelly, I will be putting some for sale outside my door in December.
