

Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day (this year on March 1st)

We often think of Shrove Tuesday as 'Pancake Day'. You may well ask why and what does 'shrove' mean anyway?

Let's go back to the beginning and think about Lent for a moment. Lent is the season when the church thinks about the coming of Easter and the fact that Christ allowed himself to be put to death. He wanted to demonstrate to us all what we should be prepared to do for our fellow men. The church suggests to us all that we should give up some simple pleasures during the season of Lent to remind us of that fact.

Returning to Shrove Tuesday, it was the day when traditionally, the congregation should go to church to be 'shriven' an old English word meaning to be forgiven of their sins. The idea being that everyone should start Lent 'with a clean slate'.

Lent was to continue for 40 days as a time of fasting and giving up all treats, including pancakes and the ingredients that go in them.

In order to be ready to give up nice things to eat

during Lent, the church suggested that treats like eggs, butter, sugar or honey should be emptied out of the larder on Shrove Tuesday to avoid temptation.

An obvious way of achieving the removal of such temptations was to make pancakes and have a bit of a celebration before the serious business of Lent.

Lent

This year Lent, or the preparation for Easter, almost entirely through March. It is a time for remembering and grieving for the sacrifice that Christ made and all those who gave their lives for others. We are encouraged to give up something we really like, as a reminder of the sacrifice of others.

What are we all going to forgo this year, sweets, wine, beer, biscuits or swearing!?

I have always wondered why we call this season 'Lent'. Well, it seems likely that it is another example of a Christian festival being grafted on to al old pagan one. The Old English word Lencten means 'Spring Season'

During Lent we will be holding a brief contemplative service of Compline each Wednesday evening at 7.30pm in Little Tey church.

On the 27th March we will be celebrating Mothering Sunday with a special, short service with children in mind, during which we will dispense some flowers for the children to give to their mothers. Do join us!

Gardening Notes March 2022 SAYING GOODBYE TO OLD FRIENDS!

I am in mourning this week for a favourite old apple tree – a Worcester Permain. It was the last remaining apple tree of those planted, originally as espaliers, on the garden wall, at Bucklers. I think they were planted between the wars which would make my Worcester about 90 years old and that is old for an apple tree. A 70 year old would be doing well, so this veteral tree had reached the end of its natural life and some. When we arrived at Bucklers in the 60's it had long since become an ordinary tree growing from a spot much too close the the garden wall.

I am sad because Worcesters have a particular resonance for me. In the late 40's my parents bought a bombed site in a suburban street in Hertfordshire on which to build a house. A single house had been flattened by the bomb and just an overgrown garden remained. It was a bit like Sleeping Beauty's castle grounds for us children and the only mature tree in that garden was a Worcester Permain. Worcesters have a particular scent that takes me back to those early days when my sister and I would climb the tree to help ourselves when the apples ripen in September. This is the thing about these apples, they need to be eaten straight off the tree, they don't keep. In these



days when seasonal eating has almost disappeared, think of strawberries at Christmas, a Worcester Permain remains a treat to be savoured in early autumn. They have a distinctive, delicious flavour.

All that remains now is to decide where to put my dead friend's replacement. It will be a proper standard tree, none of these dwarfing cultivars! That means I have to find one grown on M25 root stock. It will be vigorous and hopefully will grow big enough for my great grand children to climb and do a little apple scrumping on some future sunny September day.

Gardens never stand still and the demise of the apple tree leaves a gap in the border to be filled. I am thinking perhaps of a climbing rose. I might share some thoughts about roses with you next time. Don't forget that March is the time to give roses their final prune before the summer. I also have a wisteria to prune too – help!
