VILLAGE CRICKET MATCHES 2022 - The Players win again

Village cricket returned to Great Tey in style this summer with the successful reprise of our two annual matches – one in June and a second match in September.

Simon Mann and his team prepared an excellent wicket for both matches – thank you. Those who played described the wicket as 'bowler friendly'. Our summer refreshments were provided by the uniform groups and then, in September, the Colliers were on hand with tea and cakes as a fundraiser for the global scout jamboree in South Korea. Our umpires were all called John (which makes thing easier). A huge thanks to all of these individuals who were integral to the success of these village events.

And the matches were a success. Players were cheered on by a large crowd (more than most cricket clubs get!) and the games were played in warm sunshine and good spirits.

June

The Players (The Chequers) won the toss and put The Gentlemen into bat. Peter Wakeling struck an early six for The Gentlemen but this was a rare boundary in a rather disappointing batting display on a fast wicket. Batters fell regularly with Paul King (1 wicket for two runs) and newcomer Matt Sullivan (2-2) the pick of the bowlers. The Gentlemen posted 83-6 off their 20 overs with only Sam Collins, Peter Wakeling and Mr Wides getting into double figures.

The game was over in 10 overs with Henry Dow (28) and Matt Sullivan (26) leading the way for The Players. Freddie Brooks took his first wicket (of many I am sure) in the Great Tey village games but couldn't dislodge his father Alec who hit the winning run. The Players batted on for practice and posted an excellent 117-4.

September

The Players came into the September match full of confidence after winning the last two village games. This meant the lifetime match score between the Players (Chequers) and Gentlemen stood at 17 wins each. The crowd were full of anticipation – who would win the 35th match between these old rivals and take a lead in the series?

The Players batted first and runs came quickly with Paul King playing a cultured innings (18 runs) whilst Jack Perfect-Brown (28 not out) and Matt Sullivan (27 not out) relied on boundaries. Sam King finished off the innings with 23 not out. Only Neil Spicer and, first timer, Josh Whitehead managed to take wickets and The Players posted a formidable looking 125-2.

The reply from The Gentlemen was rather measured (slow) and batters got themselves out before they could settle in. A fine 20 from John King was the only

highlight as The Gentlemen could only post 73-9 off their 20 overs. Seven different bowlers took a wicket each for The Players making it a real team effort.

So, a clean sweep for The Players in 2022 sees them take a lead in the lifetime series of 18 - 17 over The Gentlemen. Roll on next summer!



GARDENING NOTES October 2022

Lawns!

I don't know about yours, but my lawn is looking pretty miserable! Like everyone else's, mine has been brown all over for most of the summer. As I write it is looking a bit greener in patches, but I am not sure how much of it is going to recover. I am not too fussy about the grass. I think this is a reaction to my father who would spend Sunday afternoons on his hands and knees digging out dandelions with my mother's kitchen knife. A bit of an obsessive! For years I didn't do anything about the clover, dandelions and speedwell whichmade up most of the lawn. However, when it got to the stage of having almost no grass at all I thought it needed taking in hand, so I now get some help in managing it.

In spite of the help, it looked so bad and was 99% brown thatch, I thought the time had come for a bit of professional advice so I got in touch, and here is the advice I got.

Grass is surprisingly resilient. As long as the draught doesn't start too early in the growing season, the roots will retain enough living tissue to come back even if the top growth seems to be dead. For those of you with long memories, lawns struggled much more in 1976 because the lack of rain started much earlier than this year and many lawns didn't recover and had to be re-seeded.



So, what can we do to help sort the grass out this autumn, ready for next year? My reaction had been to scarify it to get rid of all that brown thatch – quite the wrong thing to do, I was told! The new grass, which is likely to grow through the thatch, is tender and scarifying it will just destroy the new growth and perhaps the whole plant. The best thing you can do is to aerate the grass because the hot weather means that the soil has become compacted. You can hire a machine to do the aerating for you, if you have a large lawn. If it is just a small patch or you are feeling energetic you can drive a fork about two inches into the lawn at about 9 inches apart, all over the lawn. This will help the soil and new growth. At the same time spreading gypsum on the grass will help regrowth along with a proprietary winter feed. If you can't find gypsum in your local garden centre, you can certainly find it on line.

If the worse comes to the worse you can always put some seed on any bare patches that haven't recovered next spring, but with a bit of luck.....!
