GARDENING NOTES December 2022

Colour in the autumn

I have just watched a large, misshapen and therefore rather ugly, alder tree be cut down. Anthony and I planted it about 50 years ago and we planted it in the sort of place it liked, this, close to the pond in damp soil. However, it wasn't the right plant in the right place because it was very close to the drive and over the years we have had to cut it about to let things like the oil tankers drive into the yard. It was a shame to have to cut it down as its trunk was all of 18" across. The good news is that the big maple that we planted behind it and goes a super colour in autumn, is now in plain sight, so the right decision.

Bearing the above in mind, since I promised to talk about trees that go a good colour in autumn, I thought I had better try to think of smallish trees as most people have small gardens these days.

Perhaps the loveliest group of small trees of all for autumn colour, are the Japanese maples. Many of these go a spectacular colour in the autumn as well as growing in an interesting way and needing virtually no pruning. However, here in Essex we garden on heavy clay that is on the chalky side of neutral, so we are usually advised not to try to grow these beauties. Well, it's not as bad as that. You will need to take a little more trouble with them than other trees or shrubs. They do not like to be over dry in summer, so may need watering. They will put up with a slightly alkaline soil provided, and this is very important, that you improve it with lots of soil



improver, leaf mould, or ericaceous compost or any combination of the three. Japanese maples also hate wind, so plant them somewhere sheltered. They also don't mind being planted in a pot. I have had a purple acer palmatum dissectum in a pot for over 20 years with no attention other than occasional water, and it is fine. One of the easiest maples I would suggest, for growing straight into the garden, would be acer palmatum Ozakasuki. Pretty green foliage in summer, spectacular red tints in autumn and I grew it in my garden.

If you want something much more straight forward, why not plant a variety of our own native field maple? The one we see in the hedgerows is a good, easy medium sized tree which goes a wonderful butter yellow colour in the autumn. However, it is too big for a small town garden. So why not try acer campestre Carnival? It has green leaves edged with creamy white; someone wrote that it looked as if it was in flower all summer because of its leave colour. Be that as it may, it is a small, slow growing tree, it can be pruned a little to keep it a nice neat shape and its leaves go that pretty yellow shade in autumn.

PROPERTY COLUMN

Since my last column to an extent the rollercoaster few months I talked about has continued with the economic turmoil of a change in Prime Minister, Chancellor and economic policy all happening at breakneck speed, so a real period of instability that any market including the property market hates.

So where does that leave the property market now. Well at least we now have some stability economically from the Chancellor's autumn economic statement and other known factors. We can all come to terms with how this may impact us individually and what plans we can make going forward, which could include buying or selling property or not.

I am being asked recently about trends, what is going to happen to prices? Should I buy or sell now? So how to answer that? Well, it's fair to say that most commentators are predicting a slowdown in prices next year. But the exact level of any fall is an unknown until we get there and will vary regionally.

So, I would look at trends you can see in the area you are buying or selling, what does the last few months look like, is the number of properties available reducing, are the available number of buyers looking for property declining and so on. Remembering for instance if the number of properties available is declining, but available buyers is not changing much, your property will stand out more when it comes to market. Also, if you are staying in the market your purchase will be similarly affected by market trends. So do your evaluation, a good agent will help you understand the market and what your options are.

As I have said previously presentation and good marketing are key if you are selling now and value for money if you are purchasing.

The Christmas period traditionally sees a slowdown in activity and maybe offers a time to plan your property strategy for the early spring market, but also remember that the property market will always continue to move with buyers and sellers driven by different needs & requirements. Don't miss out on a bargain. New homes for instance are still waiting to be sold, maybe consider a new build if increased incentives to buy at this time of year are being offered by developers?

I would like to mention here also that having a good conveyancer supporting your property sale or purchase can be really beneficial in a changing marketplace. They will advise you and guide you through the legal formalities, in a slowing market, it is possible that this process may be faster if local searches for instance are not taking so long, but they will tell you this.

So, all in all it's a time I think to weigh up your options, affordability, what the market's doing, what is you motivation or need to move, what are your long term property needs and objectives.

Remember my views here are just that, always do your own research to make your own and best-informed decisions about property.

Advent

The churches season of Advent lasts for the 4 weeks leading up to Christmas day. The name comes from the Latin adventus, meaning 'coming'. It marks the beginning of the churches year and the coming of the birth of Christ. In former times Advent was marked by extra fasting days and purple hangings on the alter. The church still often uses the purple hangings on the alter in Advent and marks the 4 Sundays in Advent by lighting a candle on a wreath each Sunday and one on Christmas Day.

Christmas

Like so many of the Christian Festivals, the way we celebrate Christmas is a mixture of Christian and pre-Christian festivities. The date for the celebration of Christ's birth was settled in the early days of the church. It may have been partly a matter of convenience to choose a time already associated with light and re-birth at the winter solstice in the Roman Calendar. The evergreens that we bring into the house and sing about in carols, for instance 'The holly and the ivy', were used in pagan times to symbolise rebirth and the enduring qualities of plants and their ability to be 'reborn' in the coming year. Fires and lights were an important part of the celebrations. It wasn't difficult to graft onto these traditions a Christian message - red berries to symbolise the blood of Christ that would be shed at the end of Christ's life and candles for the 'light of the world'.

Christingle celebration with Nativity Play

4th December at St Barnabas Great Tey, 4pm

This celebration marks the arrival of the Christ child bringing light into the world. It reminds us that we are part of a world community and we all share the planet's bounty. We celebrate with:

An **orange**, representing the world. A **candle** pushed into the centre of the orange, then lit, representing Jesus Christ as Light of the World. A **red ribbon** wrapped around the orange or a paper frill around the candle, representing the blood of Christ.

Sweets skewered on cocktail sticks pushed into the orange, represents the fruits of the earth.

There will also be a short Nativity Play included in the service. Children of all ages with parents and grandparents are warmly invited to attend. There will be a retiring collection for UNICEF, a charity which works for disadvantaged children around the world.

Plough Sunday

Plough Sunday is a traditional English celebration of the beginning of the agricultural year. Plough Sunday celebrations usually involve bringing a ploughshare into a church, as happens in Little Tey, with prayers for the blessing of the land. It is traditionally held on the Sunday after Epiphany, the Sunday between 7 January and 13 January. Accordingly, work in the fields did not begin until the day after Plough Sunday: Plough Monday. Athough the nature of farming has changed over the centuries, Plough Sunday is seen as a way of generally celebrating farming and the work of farmers

THE CHURCHYARD AND GARDEN OF REMEMBANCE

In the next few months, we are going to publish a new leaflet concerning the way we look after the churchyard and the Garden of Remembrance. The rules that the Diocese has and the guidance that the PCC gives, have changed in recent years and we know that the parish hasn't always been made aware of these changes.
