

#### **GARDENING NOTES November 2022**

## Why do leaves turn such wonderful colours in autumn?

A maple tree which Anthony and I planted outside our gate 50+ years ago, is now fully mature and a blaze of yellows and oranges, as are lots of other trees this autumn, so I asked myself why? After talking to Frances Strickland who knows much more about these things than I do, I found the explanation that follows written by the head gardener at Wakefield Place, who knows a lot about the science, so here it is;

'Autumn colour is a fascinating phenomenon, where trees and shrubs that have been green all summer burst into flamboyant shades of yellow, orange and red.

Trees, like most plants, use a green pigment called chlorophyll to photosynthesise – that is to produce sugars from the energy of the sun, using water and nutrients from the soil. This is what gives trees the energy they need to live and grow.

In autumn, trees that lose their leaves for winter go through a process to shut down photosynthesis and reclaim as many valuable chemicals as possible. Chlorophyll is constantly breaking down and being replaced through summer, but this process slows down in autumn. This reveals all those other chemicals in the leaves that were hidden by the presence of the dominant green chlorophyll.

These include yellow flavonols, orange carotenoids and red to purple anthocyanins. The exact mixture of these compounds varies between species, and hence the degree of yellow or red colour in the leaves.



It is thought the red or purple anthocyanins either protect the leaf from cold temperatures or deter pests, such as aphids. The presence of these coloured compounds might allow the tree longer to reabsorb other valuable nutrients as temperatures drop in autumn, so they are left in the leaf to help that process.

As the tree becomes dormant, a compound called abscisic acid triggers a seal to develop at the base of the leaves, before they fall off. This reduces water reaching the leaf and traps the chemicals remaining in the leaves. They gradually break down, changing the colour of each leaf before it drops to the ground. As the process is gradual, individual leaves will be at different stages, so a tree will have leaves of many changing hues as autumn progresses.

The trigger for autumn colour to develop is a combination of day length and night temperature.

A warm dry 'Indian summer' followed by colder nights, allows more compounds to remain in the leaf and there is less time for them to slowly break down to brown before the leaves drop.'

Next month I will talk about some species that you might like to plant in your garden for maximum autumn colour.

#### **PROPERTY COLUMN**

Whilst writing this column two pieces of news had broken, firstly, the Bank of England base rate increased, secondly the Stamp Duty payment thresholds increased meaning buyers, particularly first time should benefit. Then... a raft of news followed about the likelihood of higher base rates leading to many mortgage providers revising their offerings. So, an uncertain time for our economic outlook with a knock-on effect to the UK housing market.

Uncertainty is a dampener to any market. Whatever our path economically is going to be as it becomes clearer that is what will hopefully start to stabilize things including the property market.

So, what if your selling property now. Well, my view is that back to basics has become even more important and are a constant in any market, so what do I mean by that? Put simply, a property is worth what the market is saying available buyers are willing to pay. So careful evaluation, comparison and research are key to fix the sales price at

the right level. Remembering if this price has dropped below previous expectations, if you are buying your purchase should reflect the downturn too.

Once again, I will say that there is no crystal ball with the UK property market which has repeatedly outperformed negative predictions. However, broadly speaking a slowdown in price growth is predicted exactly when or how much is the question.

I mentioned that the market is cyclical, some of us can remember when mortgage rates were much, much higher than they are now and the market at that time responded with a slowdown. You could argue, as some analysts are that it is different this time, but we will see.

#### **Harvest Festival**

## The festival was invented by the Rev Hawker, a vicar of Morwenstow in North Cornwall.

By all accounts he was a bit of an eccentric. He used to look out for seamen washed ashore after being shipwrecked and then made sure they got a Christian burial. He built a small but on the cliff

where he wrote poetry and letters. In those days most clergymen wore sober black clothes, but not he! It was said that the only black things he wore were his socks! He built a vicarage with chimney pots modelled on the church towers of his previous parishes.

Most importantly, in the 1840's he invented a service of thanksgiving for a good harvest.

Here in Great Tey, we sang familiar harvest hymns and enjoyed the fruit, vegetables and the flowers that decorated the church Most importantly we remembered that our lives depend on the natural world and how much we owe to those who, in farming the land, deliver the extraordinary range of foods that we enjoy. We gave thanks for our bountiful earth and went away reminded that we all needed to do our bit to look after the planet better.
