

WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE IN KOREA

I'm happy to report that Matthew and I are back safely from our Jamboree adventure in Korea. We both had an incredible time, and, although our trip didn't turn out to be quite as expected, we made amazing memories, had awesome experiences and saw all the sights of Korea. We met so many amazing Scouts from all over the world, and traded badges, scarfs, even uniforms with them; I am now the proud owner of a German Explorer shirt! We ate amazing foods

such as dumplings, noodle dishes and even octopus and scorpion, and thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.

So what went wrong? The brief explanation is that

there were 4 main reasons: lack of sanitation, insufficient medical facilities, lack of food for people with dietary requirements and bad management of the heat. Because of these, the UK Contingent came to the jamboree a day late to give the staff on site longer to fix these problems, and then left 8 days early when these issues were not solved. The UK Contingent leaving meant that there was less pressure on the toilets and medical facilities for the countries that stayed there, and so the problems could start to be resolved. In the end, due to a typhoon that was sweeping through the country, every Scout on site was evacuated and the jamboree effectively cancelled.

Even so, the Jamboree was still a success in my eyes. We spent the remainder of our time in a hotel in Seoul, the capital city, and got to see even more of Korea than we expected. The Korean Scout Association organised masses of day trips, concerts and visits to make sure everyone still had a great time and we still got to see all the international Scouts around the city and at the closing ceremony – a big K-pop concert – which had been relocated to the world cup stadium in Seoul.

In summary, we had the time of our lives. Thank you to everyone that supported us in our journey to fundraise for this trip, we couldn't have done it without everyone who chipped in to help us out.





GARDENING NOTES Sept 2023 Plants, I shouldn't grow, but do Phlox (Paniculata)

When we first arrived at Bucklers, one of the plants I was given and was delighted to have, was phlox. I had spotted them in my father in law's traditional herbaceous border – a riot of white, pink and mauve. Some quite dark, some pale and some two-tone. They were back of the border plants growing to a metre tall and flowering nicely from August into September. Funnily enough my newly planted phlox hardly grew more than 18inches, sulked and wilted in the summer sun.

Time to consult the books! Phlox comes from a Greek word for flame. This seems odd to me as they are not flame coloured nor flame shaped, nor are they native to the Mediterranean! They are actually native to North America, from the West Coast from New York south. Having ascertained that, I looked at the conditions they like and found out what had gone wrong. They like a rich soil, not too heavy, moist and with lots of organic matter in them. In this part of the world that means lots of watering as well. Well, of course, I had none of the right conditions for them. Unimproved heavy clay soil that hadn't had any organic matter added for at least 30 years and in an area that gets about the same amount of rain as Cyprus, was not going to suit them.

So, I reluctantly gave up growing phlox for 30 years or so. During that time the soil was worked on. Many loads of yellow clay had been removed, loads of muck and organic matter applied and the owner, by now, had the time to water all summer. Now I have a traditional herbaceous border and, in most years, have tall phlox growing in it. I shouldn't, because to be successful, I have to water the border vigorously all summer. However, things don't always go my way even now. Last winter I had a garden full of pheasants and partridge. They decided that newly sprouting phlox were quite delicious and kept eating them down to the stump. I vainly hoped that this early 'Chelsea chop' wouldn't do them any harm. Too late in the season I acquired cages to protect them. They have survived, but that is about all you can say – small amounts of stunted flowers, is as good as it gets!



Oh well, there is always another year! Next year I will protect them earlier and hope that the shooting fraternity takes out every one of the interlopers. Well, perhaps not every one, but enough, so that they do not need to raid my larder!


thank you to all our helpers. Always much appreciated by all.
